In an increasingly polarized society, human dignity is often instrumentalized and questioned. However, for Christians, it remains inalienable, as it is bestowed upon every person as the image of God. With this congress, we aim to contribute to a deeper understanding of human dignity and its protection while also discussing the dilemmas we face in our respective countries and its social and political contexts. This raises the question of where the greatest challenges to the protection of human dignity lie today and what social and political tensions are emerging in Europe. What responsibility do politics, the church, religious communities and society as a whole have to do to preserve and strengthen everybody's human dignity?

Dialogue groups

All congress participants are cordially invited to take part in the dialogue groups on Wednesday morning, 10 September. This programme item offers the opportunity to discuss specific social and ethical dilemmas in small groups. These questions will be discussed in the groups based on one or more case studies. For each case study, a thematic input is offered by an expert who presents the issues and introduces the topic. The problem description refers to human dignity from ethical, philosophical, and social perspectives, and explores possible approaches for practical guidance. After half the time, the groups are switched. This allows everyone to discuss two topics. Registration for the dialogue groups takes place on site.

Excursions

All congress participants are also cordially invited to take part in one of the excursions on Wednesday afternoon, 10 September. Small groups will visit local facilities in Berlin which exemplify dignified approaches to challenging situations. These excursions offer the opportunity to get to know specific areas of practice and to talk to local experts. Parallel to the excursions, a discussion group is offered at the Academy. Here, too, there is the opportunity to exchange ideas and discuss a thematic focus in greater depth. Please indicate which group you are joining when you register. Participation fees for on-site participants
